This qualification meets the requirements for the Care and Support Workers Pay Equity Settlement. Completion will allow employees and those seeking to enter the industry to follow a career path with qualification attainment linked to wage increases.

This program aims to equip students with the practical skills and theoretical knowledge necessary for effective support and care across various health and wellbeing contexts.

This involves training in evidence-based practices, fostering autonomy, resilience, and promoting overall wellbeing. Graduates will gain recognition for their transferable skills and knowledge valued in the health and wellbeing sector, as well as specific skills needed for Disability Support Practitioner roles.



ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

DOMESTIC

- 17 years of age or older at course start date (be at least 17 years of age before the clinical placement)
- Have recent police vetting
- Have completed year 12 or NCEA Level 2
- Pre-enrolment interview
- Students who do not meet the entry requirements may be accepted at the discretion of the department head.

INTERNATIONAL

- 18 years of age at course start date
- IELTS (Academic) 5.5 with no band lower than 5.0 (or NZQA approved equivalent)
- 3 years of secondary school education or agreed equivalent
- Have recent police vetting
- Special circumstances considered at the discretion of the Department Head.

Course outline

This program includes eight compulsory modules, and students must complete 300 hours of industry placement over eight consecutive weeks, starting in term 4 of the course.
